ARRAIOLOS CARPETS

After beginning her career in the performing arts, Rachel graduated with a Social Sciences degree fol-



lowed by a M.A. in Latin American Politics. She was a lecturer of Politics at the University of Westminster, having been responsible for running the part-time Social Sciences degree, and later becoming Head of the Department of Politics. She introduced, managed and lectured in the M.A. in Globalisation which attracted students from many parts of the world. Her interest in (and purchase of) Arraiolos Carpets began over 20 years ago on a strictly aesthetic basis when she acquired her first Arraiolos carpet. Although no expert on this subject, Rachel has employed her academic research skills to prepare this talk. The weaving of Arraiolos Carpets represents an outstanding example of Portuguese creativity in the area of handicrafts. The origin and history of this technique reveal a fascinating perspective on Portuguese life and culture. Rachel Barnard will cover these themes in her talk as well as the recent threats to the conservation and preservation of this unique Portuguese textile manufacture.
